- ☐ Verbally prompt Gannet to open the drawer by asking him "Gannet can you open the drawer and get a spoon".
- ☐ Multiple prompts might be needed to focus Gannet's attention.
- ☐ If Gannet opens and closes the drawer repeatedly, remove the hand from handle and start anew.



☐"Great Job Gannet" after Gannet grabs a spoon.


☐ "Can you now close the drawer?"

☐ "Thanks!"



□ Next, Gannet is prompted to grab the cup. Visual prompting (finger pointing) is helpful. Gannet has a tendency at this point to turn around or he gets stuck in the process and switches the spoon from his right and left hand continuously.


□ Verbal prompting such as "Gannet, please grab the cup" and/or "Gannet, focus! " work well in redirecting his attention.




- ☐ Next step is guiding Gannet from the kitchen to the table. Even though Gannet knows where the table is, many reminders might be necessary.
- ☐ Using such prompts as "Now set the spoon and the cup on the table", Gannet will set them down onto the table.



- ☐ The next step is to have Gannet get his own drink.
- ☐ Using verbal prompting such as "Gannet, can you open the refrigerator and get your drink", Gannet will open the door.
- ☐ Gannet might have to be physically oriented so he faces the inside door.
- ☐ Using verbal and visual prompting Gannet will grab the drink and close the door.
- □ It does help to keep drinks on the far right of the bottom tray.



- ☐ As with the utensils, Gannet will then walk from the kitchen to the table and set the drink on the table.
- ☐ Again, multiple promptings might be needed to redirect Gannet's attention to the task.



- □Almost done.
 Finally, Gannet will set the drink on the table and take a seat.
- □After all this work food better be ready and tasty.
